1	Understanding Local Implications Of Climate Change	Conservation Research Center (TSS)	\$30,000	\$103,750	To enhance understanding of local implications of climate change, we will generate regional temperature and precipitation projections, providing a basis for climate adaptation strategies, applied wildlife management and future economic planning decisions in JH.
2	Integrated Wildlife Research Education Program	Craighead Beringia South	\$20,000	\$97,220	Integrate our ongoing scientific wildlife studies into local high school classrooms. Our on-going tracking studies with bald eagles and cougars will allow students to follow them in real-time and learn about migration, ecology, conservation, and applied scientific study design.
3	Teton Pass Sustainable Trails Partnership	Friends of Pathways	\$20,000	\$100,000	A collaborative project to repair and restore top priority trails on Teton Pass. This will result in sustainable low impact access to the Bridger-Teton National Forest, provide close to home healthy connections to nature, and catalyze lifelong public land conservation values.
4	JH Wildlife Conservation Assessment	JH Conservation Alliance	\$9,600	\$25,900	To help conserve native species, habitats, and ecological processes, the Alliance will hire the Craighead Institute to produce a habitat modeling-based assessment of Jackson Hole's key native fauna.

(Science And Art Museum)	JH Public Art Initiative	\$9,635	\$11,906	The community will be invited to install larger-than-life specimens from our ecosystem along the Pathways System during Bike Festival in August. Business: The World's Most Powerful Force for Sustainability

Business is the most powerful economic force on the planet. Harnessing that power is the key to sustaining the planet for future generations; harnessing the power of local business is the key to sustaining the Tetons region.

1% for the Planet (1%P) is the world's most innovative effort for using the power of business to help sustain the planet. Founded in 2006, 1% for the Tetons (1%T) is the only local chapter of 1%P. Members of 1%T also automatically become members of 1%P.

HOW IT WORKS

Members donate one percent of their gross revenues to 1%T. 1%T aggregates those donations, and makes grants to support member-chosen projects proposed by local non-profits, government agencies, and businesses. 1%T grants support projects that use a small amount of money today to make a big difference tomorrow - preventing a small problem from becoming a big one, or helping a small opportunity become a major success.

GRANT IMPACTS

Since 2007, 1%T has awarded

\$485,000 to 37 projects, each proposed by different combinations of non-profits, businesses, and governmental agencies. These projects – many of which are pilot projects – include:

- Help keep invasive species out of the Snake River by installing solar-powered spray washers at local boat launches.
- Demonstrate that local restaurants and groceries can successfully and economically compost their food waste, reducing the amount of trash shipped out of the region and the amount of compost shipped in.
- Reduce lead poisoning in the region's raptors by providing copper bullets to hunters.
- Develop the first uniform, comprehensive vegetation map of the entire Tetons region, a tool identified by both planners and biologists as critical to environmentally-friendly development.
- Rehabilitate mountain bike trails on Teton Pass, giving bikers a better riding experience and helping all users by separating bikes from horses and pedestrians.
- Prove that homes in critical creek drainages can safely and economically create individual "mini-wetlands" for treating their wastewater, and in so doing help keep local streams free from human-created nutrients.
- Reduce disposable water bottle use in Grand Teton National Park by retrofitting park water fountains to make it easy for visitors to fill re-usable water bottles.
